The coming of the New Year makes me reflect on where First Baptist Church has come from over the years, and ponder about where we are going.

If you look at our church history, the "Ravenswood Baptist Church" was organized in 1866 with just 15 members. We had over 150 attending last week. The church moved several times back in the 1860s and 1870s and even met in homes. Sunday School flourished having an average attendance of 50 children back then. It was in 1875, that our church moved to the location where we are today, which was no doubt was a leap of faith and an expensive endeavor that took everyone giving to make it happen. I look at the Fellowship Hall we now have, and that endeavor was, by my understanding, a leap of faith on the church's part, and who can imagine our church today without it. Isn't it hard to believe, we just celebrated 150 years as a church a few years ago? Where we've gotten to today is impressive.

It's highly doubtful, I'll live to see the 200-year anniversary of the church in 2066 since I would be 92. We do, however, have many children in our church today, that Lord willing, will see it. For example, my kids alone all could see it --Andrea would be 72, Sami would be 69, Hannah would be about 58, John would be 64, and Aaron would be 62. Benjamin Crow would be about 60. Jazlyn Morgan would be 51, Mason and Logan Kerns would be about 55 and 52 respectively. Cari Mize would be 68. Conner Ritchie would be about 58. Little Beckett and Lincoln would be about 50 years old.

If you want to see how old you would be, just add 47 years to your age in 2019. The reality is, if you are reading this story in the anchor, you probably won't be here. None of us are likely to be. We'll be in heaven awaiting our loved ones and enjoying the time with those who are already there. This is why we must really begin focusing on what is ahead for the church. We should be actively thinking about legacy planning. God has really placed this on my heart after seeing several empty church buildings for sale in our community. None of those churches I believe ever saw their facility being placed up for sale. But, the reality is, numbers fell, the vision was lost, and resources dwindled -- it happened.

As we get older, we should begin thinking about when our time comes, what are we planning to do for the church? Have we considered the church in our estate planning? Do we want to do something for the church financially? I know many of our loved ones have left memorials over the years that have helped purchase much needed things for our church. We see Abbi playing the piano every week that was given by Anne Adkins in memory of her sons. We can enjoy the Jean Cale seating area outside of the Pastor's office. The Roush home was aquired and removed. What can we do to help ensure our church is financially sound for another 150 years, or at least the next 47 years?

Church population across the United States has dwindled steadily but First Baptist has done well despite the trends. One of the reasons for this success has been due to your love for the church and your willingness to support the church with your tithes and offerings. This is how a church meets its budget. Unfortunately, we have had made several budget reductions to match our giving. I challenge all of us, myself included, to really think about what we can do for our church to safeguard its wellbeing for the next 47 years, and that begins with a recommitment to our personal tithing and giving in the New Year.

This is critical to help ensure our children and our grandchildren, and even those children and grandchildren we haven't even seen yet, to have a place to worship where sound doctrine exists, and the love of the Lord flourishes. But as each year goes by, we continue to see the challenges of an aging infrastructure, where our furnace units and air conditioning units are in need of frequent repair, and the roof has some leaks. Having a full time pastor takes resources to ensure longevity as the cost of living increases, as well as insurance premiums and retirement that are paid by the church. We are fortunate and blessed having a secretary, a youth director, and a janitor. Additionally, the parsonage will need repairs about every year, just like our homes.

Fortunately, First Baptist has been financially sound in the past, and a strong foundation has been laid. Now, it's our job to not become complacent with what got us to this point, but rather be forward thinking enough to move our church forward in membership growth, increase our financial revenue, improve our facilities, and continually move forward with modern technology, décor, and signage. All of this takes our commitment together to give liberally with our resources, be willing to volunteer where you can to make improvements, and of course, your prayers.

The Vision Committee has important work ahead. Everything in life seems to take time and money. We cannot afford to be last out of the gate. Let us look forward with great anticipation of what we can build, not for ourselves, but for those who are coming. Moses never entered the promised land, but, he prepared the way for Joshua to do so. John the Baptist never preached with Jesus, yet, he prepared the way for Jesus' ministry. Jesus prepared the way for us to follow Him. It's our turn as a church to prepare the way for Hannah, Mason, Logan, Beckett, and the others who will be our leaders of tomorrow.

It's our time, church family, to get excited about starting to fortify our foundation -- the foundation you have helped safeguard for so many years, where the gates of hell cannot prevail against it. I challenge you this year, to pray about your role in this important endeavor. Whether, it's moving forward with church membership and helping us make the decisions that move the church forward, volunteering to help the trustees work on projects such as painting or making repairs, or perhaps you make the commitment to simply invite and bring your children and grand-kids to church more often.

For those of us of working age, we must begin investing into the church the same way we do in our homes and planning for retirement. Our children and grandchildren today will look back in time, 47 years from now, and remember this moment, saying mom and dad, grandma and grandpa, left us a church in good shape. I believe when we reflect on those who came before us, we would say the same about what got us here today. We can do this - together. I know all of you would do anything for the church that needs done. This is why, as we head into the New Year, it's important to have these serious conversations about how we move forward in giant strides. Great things have happened at First Baptist in the past, and our best days are still ahead.

May God bless each of you in 2019. May we be found growing closer than we have ever been before, loving the Lord God Almighty, whose mercy and grace endures forever. Happy New Year and let's get ready to work like there is no tomorrow.

# Christmas in Review


























FBC has a new activity for the kids under 12 - ringing the Big Bell every Sunday morning.
