As we head into the month of November, we start to think about Thanksgiving. According to history.com, the holiday is based on the Colonial Pilgrims' 1621 harvest meal. For us as Christians, Thanksgiving reminds us to be thankful for all that God has given to us. This can be in the way of salvation, the food we have, the family and friends we have, and yes - even our jobs. Abraham Lincoln was responsible for putting Thanksgiving on the map, when in 1863, he issued a proclamation asking Americans to pray to God "commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife," and "to heal the wounds of our nation."¹ Originally, he set Thanksgiving as a holiday to celebrated the last Thursday of November, but that changed in 1939 to where it is today.

While today America has made Thanksgiving more about secular activities like shopping, football, and hunting, you and I can use this holiday as a time to pause and reflect on how good God is to us. In the Wagoner home, for as long as I can remember, my family and I always take time to go around the table and say what we are thankful for. There is always a mix of expressions such as "my family," "my friends," "salvation," "my health," and even an occasional funny expression like "those mashed potatoes." Regardless of the reason, we always pause to say thanks. Let's not forget to thank our veterans, too. We have so many freedoms today because of our soldiers who serve at home and abroad.

Speaking of veterans, FBC will have a special Veteran's Day service on November 10, featuring former PFC Jessica Lynch as our keynote. We will recognize veterans who have put their lives on the line for our country with a small gift. Ms. Lynch will address the congregation about the power of prayer. I have to believe that as a former POW, Ms. Lynch depended a lot on prayer to not only get through her captivity, but also to help her heal her emotional trauma as a result of the war and as part of her recovery. You can read more about her story at the link below.² Let's begin praying that God will give her a message that blesses our hearts and moves people toward a better prayer life.

To that end, let us become more thankful as we enter November. I have two challenges for you and me. First, that we begin counting our blessings. If we do, every time we look around, we will see that we have "much more" than many other people. Even on our toughest day, there are still many people in our nation with much less. We have the Lord in our lives. We have family. We have friends. We have a church. We are alive, and God is so good to us. Second, if you have never started a family tradition in your home about being thankful at Thanksgiving, I encourage you to begin one this year. Let's not forget to do as President Lincoln suggested when we reach out to God, and that is to be sure to ask God to care for the widows, the orphans, and those who are sad or suffering. If we can do that, we can see a lot of healing in our land. We can see healing in our hearts and in our homes.

First Baptist Welcomes Jessica Lynch



On Sunday, November 10, First Baptist Church will be recognizing our veterans during the morning worship service. As part of our service, **Jessica Lynch** will be presenting her message on the power of prayer.

Jessica Lynch is a former Private First Class (PFC) in the United States Army and a former Prisoner of War.

On March 23, 2003, she was injured and captured by Iraqi forces after her unit was ambushed in Iraq. She was rescued after nine days in captivity on April 1, 2003 by U.S. special operations forces. Jessica's rescue was the first successful rescue of an American POW since World War II. Jessica has been awarded the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, and Prisoner of War medals.

Today, Jessica speaks to various groups around the United States about overcoming her obstacles and how perseverance helped her survive. Jessica further explains that despite the most difficult circumstances – whatever they might be – a positive outlook and determination can truly help individuals live fulfilling lives and accomplish their goals. Along with being a motivational speaker, she is a mother and an educator.

We would like to invite all veterans to come hear Jessica's message and be a part of our service.



Brock's message for Christ is clear and effective. He has seen God touch thousands upon thousands of lives through his ministry.

Union Mission

We recently had a coat collection (Thanks to Fred McGoskey for organizing it!) for the Union Mission in Charleston. Some of us may not know much about UM. Below is some information on it origins.

Isn't it amazing what a few kind words can do? What was meant to touch one heart 108 years ago is still touching hearts today.

If you are familiar with the story of Saul in the Bible, you will understand the story of Pat B. Withrow. Both were interrupted by the Lord which changed their lives and their purpose.


Pat was born on October 9, 1880, five miles west of Charleston. Although he had good parents, he grew up very poor and lost his mother at age nine. From that point on, his life tool a dramatic turn. The day after his mother's death, he, his two brothers and sister were separated and sent to live in different homes. At only mine, Pat had lost everything. In the next few years, Pat floated from home to home working for room and board. He attended school occasionally finishing only the third reader before leaving entirely.

At the age of fifteen, Pat had his first real job. He was working for John R. Jenkins and worked for \$7 per month. With his first two months of pay, pat went into town and bought his first suit. He was so proud. For the first time in his life, he felt important.

From there, Pat went to the city to work at the Farley Hotel where he discovered the saloon next door and vegan drinking at the age of sixteen. The first drink was just a "friendly" drink. The first time he played pool was just for "fun". The first game of cards was just a "friendly" game. The first time he was arrested, it was a "mistake". The next thing he knew, gambling and drinking became his life. He could not quit no matter how hard he tried.

One night after losing everything and continuously lying to his wife, Pat decided to end his life and headed to the Kanawha River to jump in. as he approached the river, something stopped him and he couldn't do it. Although he continued to try and change, he did not have the will power to give up everything in his life. People would say, "There is no use to fooling with Pat Withrow. He is too far gone." Even Pat thought it was impossible for him to get back to where he needed to be.

One day, a preacher invited Pat to church. He told him, "Jesus loves you!" Pat was touched. No one had ever told him that before. He attended a revival where Dr. John Beddow spoke from Malachi 3:8 titled "Will a man rob God?" Realizing he was the biggest thief in the building, Pat decided to go forward that night. From that point on, Pat served the Lord. He put away the old things and became new. The Lord placed in him a passion for souls, so he began telling everyone his story. With the Lord's guidance, he found a building in Charleston on the corner of Clendenin and Lovell Streets. On October 1, 1911, with \$100 donated by Colonel John Q. Dickinson, the Union Mission was opened, and the first service was held. The mission's first year's budget was \$2,200.

During the following years, the mission expanded to include 8 buildings covering almost an entire city block in downtown Charleston. In 1970 the Charleston Urban Renewal Authority acquired the entire downtown complex and the mission, except for Crossroads Men's Shelter, relocated to South Park Road in Kanawha City. It is out of this humble beginning that Withrow helped start more than 40 other missions across the United States.

While some things have changed over the years, God's continued faithfulness to Union Mission and those we serve had remained consistent. We continue today what Brother Pat began 108 years ago.

FINANCE INFORMATION

2020 Budget

The Finance Committee finalized a proposed budget for 2020 and it was approved at the Annual Business meeting on October 16. Copies are posted on the bulletin board outside the office as well as specific monthly information on giving and disbursements. All those in charge of expenditures in various line items are encouraged to check the information each month to make sure they are staying within their budgets (particularly as we close out the year). If there are any questions, please bring those to the attention of a committee member or Jo Hendricks, treasurer.

Building Fund Drive

Our church established a Building Fund this year for the purpose of meeting mounting building and maintenance needs costs. We are still working toward payment of the 3 new air conditioning units that have been installed at a cost of \$24,000.

The Finance Committee has voted in favor of a Building Fund Drive to contribute to these costs. We are "kicking off" the Change Challenge! Individuals, families, groups, etc.. are encouraged to take one of the "change bottles" and fill it with coins. There are two choice programs:

___Quarter-Dime Club (fill bottle with either quarters, dimes or a combination of both)

_ Change Challenge (fill bottle with any denomination of coins)



Those who participate and turn in their filled bottles will have their names engraved on the Building Fund plaque.

In addition, those who make a contribution will be recognized on the plaque as well. Remember, it's tax-deductible!

Platinum Level--- \$1000 or more Gold Level-----\$500-\$999 Silver Level------\$100-\$499 Bronze Level-----\$50-\$99

Please mark your contribution as Building Fund if you feel led to give to this program. Let's finish the year with a positive balance in the fund so that we may begin 2020 (which means we will need to acquire \$4052.10 by Dec 31.

As of the 3rd Quarter Business Meeting, the Building Fund has:

Received------\$15,935.09 We have Spent------\$15,989.09 For a current deficit of -\$54.09 We have one last payment due Nov 5 on the new heat/air units of \$3998.

Church Change Challenge







FBC Thanksgiving Dinner Our Social/Fellowship Committee has been busy preparing for our annual church Thanksgiving Dinner.



However, 'God doesn't call the equipped: He equips the called.' The Bible tells how God used people with similar doubts to change the course of history:

Moses—not a leader or speaker, but God used him to bring Israel out of slavery

David—youngest of all his brothers but God worked through him to defeat a giant. Eventually had him crowned King

Paul—killer of Christians before he met Jesus, became one of the most highly regarded and prolific writers and church planters in history

God doesn't just want to work through you— He wants to work in you.

Reflections from our BWA Women's President



Recently, I talked to a woman who felt overwhelmed by the constant requests for service by other people. "I feel like I am not living my own life," she complained. And this is a common problem for women all over the world. It is almost unnecessary to encourage women to serve, as they seem to have perfected that area! But, as I was listening to the woman across from me. one thing hit me. She was

not serving anyone, she was slaving away. When I told her, she immediately realised the difference!

The Bible makes this difference between being an heir in the house, and being a slave in several places (see eg. Gal 3:23-4:9 or John 15:14-17). A slave has to serve the master and barely any of her own needs are met or asked about. A daughter of the house is cared for and whatever she does, she does out of her free will to enrich her household and her Father's business.

God did not create people to be slaves to anyone. When we "slave away", we do so because we have allowed things and people to become "gods" who make unreasonable demands on us. As slaves we are driven by fear to offend these masters and be punished. Even our own sinful and selfish nature is such a master. When we feel overwhelmed with service, we need to ask the tough question: Why am I doing this? For instance: Why do I clean all the time? Who am I afraid off? What do I want to accomplish with this: do I need people to love me more? We are daughters of the house, but behave like slaves. Like the older son in the story of the Prodigal Son (Lk 15) we are unaware that we cannot earn our acceptance, because all is ours (1Cor 3:21–23)!

On that basis we serve as God's daughters. We know we belong and do not need to earn anything. We live because we are beloved by God. We spend time at his table, talking to him and getting to know his mind. We love to contribute to our own household when we serve, and get involved in "God's business" of saving the world with all we have. Quiet times and busy times meld together. Our needs are taken care of by the Father who we belong to as children and heirs. We do not work from guilt or fear to earn our living. We shine, as we serve. The full potential of our Father's inheritance becomes visible to the world, as we do what we love and were gifted for. True, that too may be consuming and busy, but this service fills our batteries, it does not drain them!

So, dear sisters, let us ask the hard questions as we pray. And then, let us shine in this heart-filling service which changes the world.
