As we head into the month of May, we are still under a "stay at home order" by the state government in conjunction with the federal government as a result of the continuing spread of the Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic. We have been in this position now for a month. To date, no one in our church has been affected by the virus directly. However, we know that could change at any time. Thus, we need to continue to be safe at home by following the guidance of our health officials. If you need something from town and are concerned about your wellbeing, please know we have volunteers who can do some errands for you.

Meanwhile, during these unprecedented times, our church has taken extraordinary steps during the last several weeks to maintain both worship services and Bible study. While these services have been broadcast live over the Internet and over the phone lines reaching thousands of people, we know that some of you do not have Internet and are probably feeling isolated. We currently are making our sanctuary available by appointment for prayer or to watch a recorded version of the most recent sermon. The reason an appointment is currently required, is to allow no more than one family to be present at a time in the sanctuary. If this is something you are interested in, please call the church office.

During Easter, we had the privilege to serve 85 persons in a "curbside communion-by-car" service. This was a blessing for all of us. It certainly was not the same as serving communion in the sanctuary, but it was something aimed at being special for Easter. In my Christian life, it was only the second time that I can remember not being in a church building on Easter. I'm sure for many of you this was the same. As expected, our church board meetings have been canceled until things settle, with the exception of the deacons, who are meeting by phone due to the special needs of the church. I want to thank those of you who are continuing to give your tithes and offerings by mail, online through our website, and those who drop them off at the church curbside. It is refreshing to know that you understand that the church continues to have financial obligations even when we are not meeting in the building, and you all are helping tremendously. For those who typically give cash during the service, you can simply place that in a sealed envelope and bring it by curbside and we will submit it for you confidentially.

To that end, the deacons and I are striving to improve our church broadcasts. We are purchasing some equipment that will help us keep the message going out in a professional manner reflecting the positive image of the church. We realize the broadcast is not perfect, but it is improving. I want to thank Abbi Woods and Ann Johnson for joining me every service and providing worship music for our service. This is a lot of work and sacrifice for them during these difficult times and they have never wavered. I want to thank Kevin Woods, our deacon chairman for his relentless work on the technology end, working with the deacons to ensure we have what we need for the broadcast. He films the service each week. And lastly, I want to thank Rev. Bill Stewart for his technology assistance. Bill has helped us with the broadcast, provided us with Zoom technology for phone broadcasts, and oversees the Wednesday Bible Study technology. This ministry team loves the Lord as much as I do. I cannot thank each of them enough for stepping up to the plate to help bring you the service each week. When you see them, please let them know how much you have appreciated their help. They are volunteers, who despite the orders to stay home, come by each week in an effort to reach you and the community in this time of need.

I also want to thank those of you who are financially supporting the deacon fund that is helping with this broadcast endeavor. Your support is making a difference during this lockdown. Please know, Susan West and I are at the church throughout the week if you need to reach us. Most of you have my cellphone if you need to reach me directly. If you need to come by the office for prayer or to visit with me, you are welcome to do so. I will wear a mask and ask you to do the same. I can also accept Facetime calls on my cellphone or Zoom calls if you prefer to meet that way so we can see each other over technology. I miss seeing you all, I really do. I miss visiting with you the most.

I want you to know that I am praying for you and your family. I pray for our church daily. My prayer is that we all remain healthy. Jennifer has not let me go inside of a store yet, so even I am being guarded. If cabin fever has set in, I understand.

In closing, I trust this pandemic will soon pass so that we can get back to normal operations. I miss all of you dearly. For some of you, this may be the first time in your life that you can remember missing this much church. So, please stay in touch with me. I need your prayers as we lead during these challenging times. Know that we are sending e-mails almost daily from the church with updates and even mailing letters occasionally. The weekly bulletin is being posted online but if you don't have Internet access, we will be happy to mail you one. Additionally, please know that you can now watch the most recent sermon on our website for those who do not have Facebook but have Internet access. Those services are posted online on Monday and Thursday. Please know that I love each of you and I am praying for you and your family.


Please save your yard sale goodies for our (tentative) Youth Yard Sale scheduled July 9 and 10. We are hoping to get some large items to sell.

As the United States and the globe deal with the death and devastation wrought by the coronavirus, American Baptist Home Mission Societies (ABHMS) and International Ministries (IM), also known as the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society—on behalf of American Baptist Churches USA—seek One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) COVID emergency support to help families, churches and communities find relief and recovery across the United States, Puerto Rico and countries around the world served by IM.










Children's Easter Egg Hunt FBC Style


















Camp Alpha!

It's time to start brainstorming and gathering ideas of how we can promote our Mission Outreach Project (MOP) 2020. Camp Alpha is a kid's church camp located in Ryazan, Russia. Thanks to the long-standing partnership between the Russian Baptist Union and the West Virginia Baptist Convention, the camp is being constructed in likeness to our very own Camp Cowen and Parchment Valley. The buildings may not look exactly the same, but the same goal is there...teaching kids about Jesus in a fun and exciting way. Last year, they had 65 kids attend their summer camp with ten students accepting Christ in their lives for the first time. It's exciting to think that God can use our \$6,000 to help kids in other parts of the world learn to grow as disciples of Christ. Put on your thinking caps, start brainstorming, and let the creative juices start to flow... Camp Alpha needs our help!

Rice Rice Baby!

The 2019 Mission Outreach Project (MOP) was a huge success thanks to all of YOU! The creativity was flowing in the various ways you promoted the rice projects in your churches and your hard work paid off in the grand total of \$18,674.94!!!!!! You tripled the goal of \$6,000 by three times! Kim Brown is thankful for the ABW-WV prayers and funding for their rice program. We have helped feed many House of Blessing families in Chiang Mai, Thailand. The school continues to provide early education for these children as well as various parental and health training sessions for the parents. They had 16 children that graduated from the House of Blessing preschool and will be moving on to the local schools now. The other exciting news for House of Blessing is that the new missionary family has arrived in Thailand. Mark and Alise Juanes and their three children are now in Thailand and attending language school this year. Please continue to pray for Kim's stamina and health while she continues her work at the House of Blessing, House of Love, and the Center for the Development of Persons with Disabilities (CDPD).

Around the World

Have you been wondering what is happening with our ABW-WV Missionaries as they ride out this quarantine in their host countries? I reached out to each family and asked specific questions so that you could learn the latest news from around the world and know how WE can be praying and helping them.



Rhonda Reed - Bolivia

Q: What projects are you currently working on? A: Our projects for the House of Hope are all on hold. Bolivia is in a complete lockdown. I have not been out of my house for 31 days. JD can walk to the store only on Thursday morning (based on last number of his ID card). We are not allowed to drive so none of our leaders can drive to the communities. We are trying to raise money to buy food for the many families in the communities because they are not working and do not have food.

Q: What is your favorite food item from the country you are living in?

A: My favorite food is a breakfast biscuit called cunapes. They are made with yuka flour and cheese.

Q: Is there anything special you would like us to be in prayer for?

A: Bolivia, the health system cannot handle this virus. Honestly, no third world countries can. Our city of almost three million has 26 ventilators total. We are just starting with cases and have very little testing. Please pray for protection for our family and leaders. Grace and Abie are both in WV. We are having many Zoom calls with colleagues and we are safe. All flights and borders are stopped so we are riding it out.

Debbie Myers - Mexico

Q: What projects are you currently working on?
A: Our main priority right now is putting together a Vacation Bible School curriculum and will be teaching it to the teachers hopefully in person but if not, we will video it.

Q: What is your favorite food item from the country you are living in?

A: Chilaquiles verdes (fried tortillas in a green salsa)

Q: What do you like to do in your spare time?

A: I enjoy walking the dog to the park, working with my flowers, and crafting.

Q: Is there anything special you would like us to be in prayer for?

A: That folks in our communities would not be affected by this virus. They do not have a means to get to a hospital. Please also pray that our kids will stay safe during this time in California.



Denise Aragon - Mexico

Q: What projects are you currently working on? A: Women's Ministry and Leadership Core Group – Each congregation has chosen women representatives. In February, six CICEM representatives came for a two-day meeting where Debbie Myers and I gave an overview of women's ministry. It was a time of encouragement, fellowship, vision, and prayer. We plan to meet twice more this year for workshops where the congregation representatives will share how women's ministry has shaped up in their communities.

Literacy and After School Program – A Tsotsil church is piloting a literacy program that we are hoping to replicate in other CICEM communities. The literacy program starts with 18 adults and young adults and divided into two groups. Group A knows how to somewhat read, but they do not know how to write. Group B does not know how to read or write. at all. The Pastor says that when these people are asked to serve in leadership roles in their community churches, they decline because they feel their reading and writing will be a hinderance. Group C consists of 27 children that go to school and need extra help with their homework. A goal is to eventually have Group A students helping with Group C and to build their skills to be able to serve in leadership roles in their churches.

One of the blessings of this project is that we do not have to be there. Thanks to your financial support, we were able to buy about four months of materials for this program. When the program first started, COVID-19 had not been a problem in Mexico yet. School has now been cancelled since March 20th. but Group A and B are still meeting under social distancing guidelines. We will have upcoming meetings to decide the future of the programs. Puppets and Youth Ministry - Another ministry that could use prayer is with the youth ministry from one of the CICEM churches in the Tseltal area. Lubeck Community Church blessed them with puppets and volunteers that helped build a stage. The meeting we had scheduled with the Youth Pastor to train and deliver the puppets has to be rescheduled due to the COVID-19.

Medical Care for Pastors, Leadership, and Communities – This project has tugged on our hearts, but we felt hopeless since we don't have medical backgrounds. The people in the communities do not have proper medical care, sometimes requiring them to travel to other towns to be seen by a doctor. Many people do not have the money or means to see a doctor. Part



of this program designated funds for specialized medical attention for Pastors, their families, and/ or church leaders. The funds cover the doctor's fees, medicine, travel expenses, medical exams, and sometimes lodging expenses. We have formed a relationship with the parents of one of Ziba's classmates. It turns out that both parents are medical doctors and we have been able to share about the ministry with them and they have shown interest in helping our communities. This project has also been put on hold due to the COVID-19 restrictions.

Q: What is your favorite food item from the country you are living in?

A: The favorite food for our kids would be Taco de Carne al Pastor, which is basically pork tacos. These tacos usually have pineapple on them, but my kids takie if off but love the flaor of it. Juan likes those type of tacos too but when we go out for breakfast, he usually orders Chilaquiles Divorciados. It is fried corn chips with green and red salsa, sour cream, cheese, and an egg on top. As for me, I love everything and it's hard not to try everything but whenever I see Chicharron en salsa verde (pork rinds in green sauce), that is my go-to.

Q: What do you like to do in your spare time?
A: Juancito and Ziba are very active kids and before COVID-19, our days consisted of taking them to soccer practice in which they both play very well. Juancito also had track practice and Ziba took gymnastics. Aside from the kid's games and practices, we like to watch a movie, play a board game, go for a walk downtown to get ice cream. The kids and Juan have also been riding their bikes but I still need to get a bike. For self-care, I like to exercise, garden, color, work puzzles, play board games, watch Nailed It (regular people trying to make fancy cakes) and try to cook healthy meals.

Every June for one week, BK brings local youth and adult leaders from churches around the state of West Virginia and surrounding areas together to help those in Jackson County who may need assistance with small projects or home repairs.

Through application numbers of the Jackson County community are chosen based on the need or want of the project they request completed.
