

REVIVAL!

DEFINITION OF REVIVAL according to Richard Owen Roberts: an extraordinary movement of the <u>Holy Spirit</u> producing extraordinary results

I was stunned when I read the information below on religious revival. Why? Is my vision of God too small or my faith too little in the Creator of the Universe? God, please forgive me! Before reading these stories, prepare your heart first by reading and meditating on Isaiah 6:1-8. (Repentance and forgiveness must always precede our extraordinary journey with God.)

FIRST STORY: "In the mid 1800s, people began to be converted at the rate of 10,000 a week in New York City. The movement spread throughout New England. Church bells would bring people to prayer at eight in the morning, twelve noon, and six in the evening. Baptists had so many people to baptize, they couldn't get them into their churches. They went down to the river, cut a big square in the ice, and baptized them in cold water. In one year (1857), more than one million people were converted. The revival crossed the Atlantic, broke out in Northern Ireland, Scotland, Wales, England, South Africa, South India—anywhere there was an evangelical cause, there was revival—and its effect was felt for 40 years." (J. Edwin Orr – Baptist minister and historian)

SECOND STORY: It all began with a woman (Mrs. Colville, a Baptist missionary from England) unafraid to speak spiritual truth over tea. James McQuilkin, in attendance at the tea party, was uncomfortable as she spoke openly about the condition of the soul. After another guest described her Christian experience, Mrs. Colville stated, "My dear, I don't believe you have ever known the Lord Jesus." James McQuilkin quickly left the tea party knowing that what she spoke was true of him. After experiencing no peace for two weeks, James McQuilkin found peace by trusting the Lord Jesus. The following year McQuilkin felt burdened to pray for his neighbors. He asked three friends to join him. Once a week, the four men gathered at the village schoolhouse to pray for each person in their community by name (Ahoqill, Ulster Province,

Ireland – September, 1857). At the same time, God was laying the same burden on many hearts and similar prayer groups started throughout northern Ireland. Pastors began preaching about revival. But widespread revival did not come. God's people still prayed for 19 more months. On the night of March 14, 1859, the McQuilkin group invited Christians to a prayer meeting at the Ahogill Presbyterian Church. The church was so crowded that the meeting was moved out into the street. Hundreds of people knelt in the mud and rain, confessing their sins and praising God. They were the first of 100,000 people God called to Himself in 1859 in what became known as the Ulster Revival. (I love this next part of the story.) There was a great spiritual movement among young people. It was not uncommon to find children and adults listening to the preaching of 12-year-old boys in the streets. The results of the revival in County Antrim (location of Ahogill) left jails empty and no crimes to investigate. A visitor to Ulster reported "thronged church services, abundant prayer meetings, increased family prayers, unmatched Scripture reading, increased giving, converts remaining steadfast." (The One Year Christian History, E. Michael & Sharon Rusten, pp. 148-149.)

Growing up I often heard, and as a pastor I know I have given the counsel, "When God closes a door, he opens a window". It is a very cliché thing to say, but in these months, we can tell you that this is precisely what has happened.

Like the rest of the world, the year 2020 has been a bust so far. After over 4 months of pandemic and the reality that it will continue at least for the near future, for many it seems like all ministry has come to a halt. Churches are reeling and people are up in arms that they can't return to worship with their friends and family all together. We live in a different reality. It kind of seems like the reality that we had grown accustomed to ended abruptly, kind of like the door to our future was slammed in our faces.

For many of us, and for many different reasons, it is easy to see this as an apocalyptic event. How will we survive? Will we ever return to "the way things were?" So many questions, but in our looking for answers it seems that just as the old adage goes, "God opened a window".

Our family left Bolivia on the last day in April due to the pandemic and very soon after we got back, we got a call from a colleague with an interesting question. An old college friend was in touch with her and shared that he worked for Wheaton College and they needed to provide cloth masks for every student to return to classes in the fall. He was wondering if she knew of any one needing work or a ministry that needed funds. This is where we come in.

We had been praying for an opportunity to raise money for the House of Hope and the Project of Hope Foundation for months, as the giving had been down, and with the pandemic our resources had dropped and we were in the "red". This money would bring us not just back into the positive side, but give us a cushion we could use for the rest of the year. It wasn't what we were hoping for, but as I said before...it was a window of opportunity.

We consulted with colleagues and friends and determined to put out the clarion call to see what we could come up with. So many of you came out in full force. Whether it was just 10 masks or one church that did over 500, it was like over 100 churches and individuals just jumped through the window to help us out.

From every part of the US, men and women, quilting groups and Sunday school classes stepped up and in just Over 2 months we were able to ask for, receive, sort, package, and send just over 10,000 masks to Wheaton College and receive \$10,000+ to go toward the ministry.

What a great blessing to be able to start out our year of US/Puerto Rico assignment with such a successful project. It is simply because people from all across the United States joined together to help one ministry meet a goal.

Now here is the question: What do you think would happen if we could capitalize on that momentum to try and do work in our communities. Churches and ministries coming together to help feed the homeless, or provide clothes for those who couldn't buy on their own.

Maybe we could extend the hand of hospitality to those who were struggling with addiction and help them overcome it, or even to work together to care for those that are undergoing trauma due to the Coronavirus (whether physical or emotional). What could happen if we as the citizens of the Kingdom of God would actually put our King (Jesus) first and actually do what we can to bring about His will in the world?

Do you hear that? I think it sounds like another window creaking open.

Focus on Sunday School:

Sunday School teaches us many things. There are exciting stories and people in the Bible. Have you heard about Ehud, the great spy for Israel?

The Israelites had turned away from the Lord at different times and the Lord allowed their enemies to overtake them. This particular time, God's people had served Eglon, the king of Moab for 18 years.

After repenting and crying out to God, the Lord raised up Ehud, the son of Gera from the tribe of Benjamin, as a deliverer. It's interesting that the Bible even mentions him being left handed. Ehud prepared a special sword, very short - only about 18 inches long. He secretly secured the sword on his right thigh under his clothes. Ehud was also given a tribute to take to the fat king Eglon.

Ehud gained entrance to where King Eglon was seated which was in a cool room on the roof. He presented the king with the tribute and let the king know he had a special secret message for him. Eglon sent everyone away so Ehud could tell him this secret.

While they were alone on the roof, Ehud told him, "I have a message from God for you". With that Ehud reached with his left hand, drew the sword from his thigh and thrust it deep into the king! Ehud escaped from the roof to his people Israel. He then led an army of Israelites to a victory over the Moabites!


