



COVID-19 continues to have an impact on our community, state and nation — and even our church. Masks have become mandatory statewide when entering public buildings whenever social distancing is unable to be maintained. Church services like ours are held outdoor and online to bypass the mask requirement. However, we are still required to wear them inside the sanctuary. For most of us, it is no longer strange to see people walking by in our community wearing a mask. At first, everyone including me seemed to look twice or stare in awe at someone wearing a mask. Now, we seem to accept the fact that masks are a part of life today, even when we do not agree with them. Meanwhile, we all wonder if there is an end to the pandemic around the corner, even though none of us knows for sure. Perhaps it will take a vaccine or medicine to be readily available before we resume life "pre-COVID normal". For me, as time continues much like post-9/11, I find myself finding it harder to remember life before restrictions. When I travel today and have extra security precautions, it is just a part of life. I wonder if the COVID-19 restrictions will continue after the vaccine is available. Looking back, March 2020 seems distant and thinking of life before the virus seems even more distant to me. The notion that a pandemic could change the way we live forever, is troubling. But, we will persevere regardless.

With that in mind, I was reading an article last week in Biblical Archaeology Review (Fall 2020) entitled "Pandemics in Perspective," written by Sarah K. Yeomans. She claims that the pandemic we are experiencing is not unprecedented which is evidenced by looking back across the world's history. She highlights as examples the plagues of Athens, Antonine, Cyprian, and Justinian as four that had significant impacts on life. She wrote Athens is the earliest eyewitness account of a pandemic when in 15 BCE 25% of the population died from the disease which occurred about the same time as a series of wars with Sparta. She wrote the constantly burning funerals caused the Spartans to retreat. **But** life got back to normal.

The Antonine Plague occurred in Rome more than five centuries later. Yeomans wrote, legions of the Roman army returned with both booty and a mysterious disease that was referred to as the great plague that killed an estimated 7-8 million people, or 10% of its population. Yet, life returned to normal. Then she explained the Plague of Cyprian which killed 5,000 leading to the "third century crisis" that created social upheaval and instability that lasted decades and led to its dissolution in the West. But eventually, life got back to normal. Lastly, Yeomans wrote about the Plague of Justinian in 541-546 CE, which involved a bacterium similar to that known as the bubonic plaque. The mortality rate of that pandemic was 50-60 percent. But, once again, things went on, and life continued.


COVID-19 has hospitalized many in West Virginia and in our community and thousands across the United States; also we have seen deaths here at home and nationally. But as in all pandemics, things get better. Most of the time, at least in our generation, things will get better after a vaccine or medical intervention is introduced. While many of us in our church have not had COVID-19 to date, chances are you know someone by name who has had it. Some of you may know of someone who has passed as a result. Regardless, all of us have been impacted by the disease. Our sense of security, well-being, and fundamental rights to do as we please, have all been impacted. Let us hold fast to our faith during these challenging times. Let us look for how God can use this pandemic to bring about something good in the long run. My hope for First

Baptist, is perhaps the pandemic has allowed us to reach people through social media and streaming of our service online and on phone to tell people about Jesus, that may not have otherwise darkened our door. Can this COVID-19 lead us to the next great revival? If it does, will we be ready? Let us be ready to share Jesus with someone who feels like their life is spinning in circles as a result of this pandemic.

On a good note, First Baptist will be moving our worship service indoor as of October 1 and use our indoor service guidelines unless things change with the health department. When we go back inside, our services will move back to the normal 10:45 start time. We will be monitoring the COVID-19 virus and once we feel comfortable with where we are, we hope to reinstate Sunday School at 9:30. Our Wednesday service will continue online. We do hope to have communion that first Sunday in October. To that end, we have learned from history, there will always be another pandemic down the road until the Lord calls us home. We don't have to live in fear, but we do have an obligation to keep the most vulnerable among us safe. Let us all pause and thank the Lord continually for His mercy and His grace, even during times of a pandemic, knowing that "this too shall pass." Thank Him for keeping you safe.

We continue our Bible studies as we look at Isaiah to see what the prophet can tell us about how God wants us to live today.


I'm going to miss those of our group that will be going away for college and life. But all the kids are great and I thank God for giving me the opportunity to teach them His word.

Red Cross Blood Drive


The next Red Cross Blood Drive will be October 5 from 1:00 to 6:00 pm in the Fellowship Hall.



<u>Rockefeller</u> could sign his name to a piece of paper and make it worth a million - that's capital.


<u>Uncle Sam</u> can take silver, stamp an emblem on it, and make it worth a dollar - that's money

I absolutely love the theme "Boots on the Ground" that Sandy Foster Currey, Coordinator for ABWM State Conference, chose for our first-ever Virtual State Conference in 2020. Being a Christian in a hostile and broken world is much like being a soldier, sacrificing much for the greater good.

My dad served in the army as a foot soldier in WWII. From time to time, he would give me a glimpse of the sacrifice required to fight the battle against the enemy. He told me of marching through France when the days were so hot that the sweat would ooze from their boots and make mud with the dirt. The seasons changed bringing snow and the men in his unit would huddle together for warmth through the night without a fire so that their location would remain hidden. Especially hard for me to hear was that my dad and his fellow soldiers would sometimes go without food because their location was unknown. He said his commanding officer would always encourage them that the food was coming and to not give up. Yet, the battle continued, and the soldiers had their boots on the ground.

As followers of Jesus Christ, we, too, are in a battle of good versus evil. Should we be any less dedicated than our soldiers that fight for freedom around the world despite the hardships? We are either all in or not. There is no straddling the fence. Jesus sets the example. Ridicule, mockery, beatings, false accusations, temptations, betrayal, and the ultimate sacrifice of death on the cross were all part of what Jesus willingly faced in His battle to bring God and His message of salvation to the lost of this world. So, girls, keep your boots on the ground! The battle is not easy, but there is a world of broken and lost people that need to hear about Jesus and His Love through you!

The pandemic of 2020 could have stopped us dead in our tracks, but good soldiers find another way to fight the battle. As believers in Jesus Christ, our witness is ongoing regardless of what this world throws at us. I am blown away at how busy and creative the women!

Building Fund


Josiah repented and gathered all the people to him. He read the *Book of Covenant* that had been found and vowed to walk after the Lord and keep His commandments. All the people joined him.
